What is Air Force ROTC?

Air Force ROTC is a college program that allows you to earn your degree while training to become an Air Force officer. Air Force ROTC offers challenges and benefits that will foster individual growth that cannot be found elsewhere in college. You will build leadership, management and many other skills while in the program. After completing all of your degree and training requirements, you will be commissioned as a second lieutenant in the United States Air Force.

General Requirements

To participate in Air Force ROTC, you need only to be a full time undergraduate or graduate student at a participating school (see back of this pamphlet). In order to complete the program you will need to:

- Be physically and medically qualified
- Be of good moral character
- Be in good academic standing
- Pass the Air Force Officer Qualifying Test (AFOQT)
- Complete Field Training (28-day summer course)

Scholarships

Scholarships may be offered that pay up to full tuition, fees and textbooks. In addition, contracted cadets will receive a monthly allowance.

College Students- Qualified students enrolled in the AFROTC program are eligible for scholarships if they meet the requirements. Selection is based on GPA, physical fitness, standardized test scores and overall performance as a cadet.

High School Seniors- There are 4 year scholarships available on a competitive basis to high school seniors. Visit www.afrotc.com to start application.

AFROTC Curriculum

The curriculum is divided into the General Military Course (GMC) and Professional Officer Course (POC). The GMC lectures are 1-credit courses in Air Force history and general military knowledge. POC lectures are 3-credit courses covering leadership, management and national security policy. Both POC and GMC cadets participate in a weekly leadership laboratory, where they engage in a variety of activities, including group leadership projects and drill and ceremonies. In addition to lecture and LLAB, cadets participate in physical training sessions.

All cadets are required to attend Field Training, a 28-day summer course usually completed between sophomore and junior year. Field Training is a physically and mentally challenging series of group projects, fitness activities and leadership exercises.

Maryland Honor Guard - An organization that focuses primarily on the perfection of drill through: the presentation of colors at special events, armed drill team performances, competitions, cordons, and many other things.
